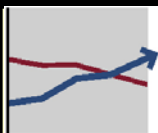
Voters overwhelmingly agree we should start now to reduce global warming pollution

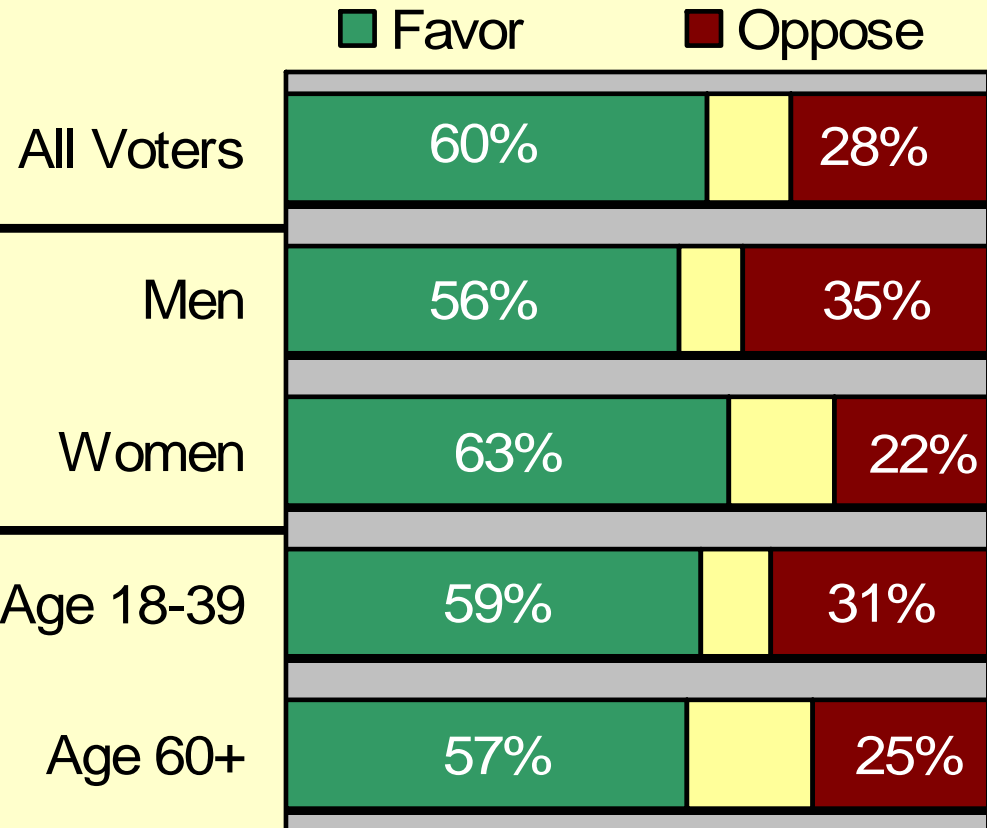
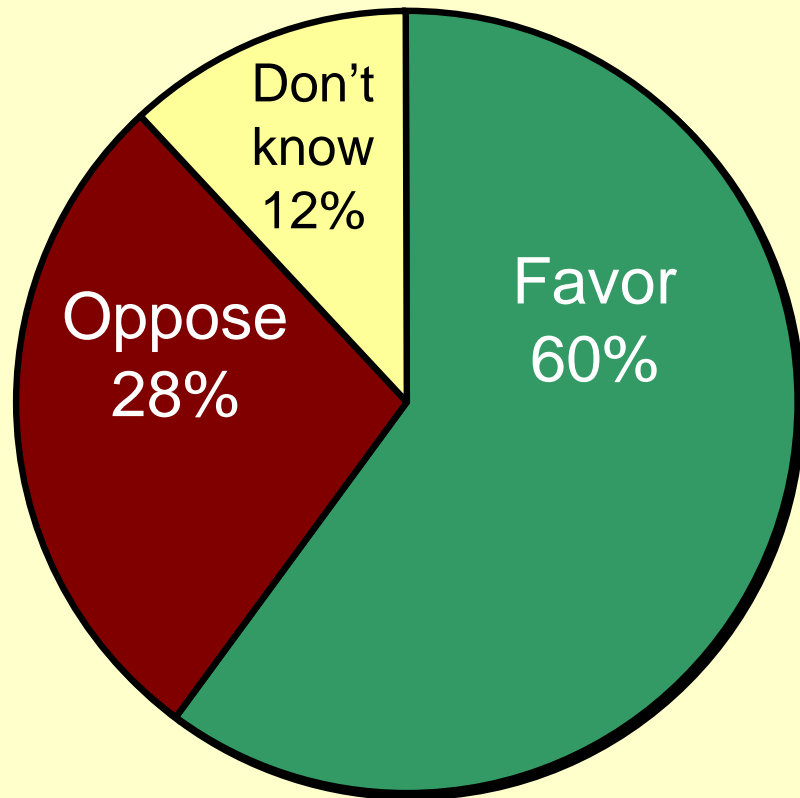

A 60% majority of voters favor a carbon cap and trade proposal to reduce global warming pollution in the U.S.

As you probably already know, burning fossil fuels such as coal, oil, and natural gas results in carbon emissions that scientists believe contribute to global warming. I would like to describe a proposal — called a carbon cap — that will reduce global warming pollution in the U.S. The U.S. Government would require reductions of global warming pollution by placing a mandatory limit on carbon dioxide and other gasses from power plants, refineries, and heavy industry. It would also create a market to allow corporations that burn fossil fuels to achieve the lowest cost emission reductions by buying and selling pollution permits.

Based on this information, do you favor or oppose this proposal to reduce global warming pollution in the U.S.?
